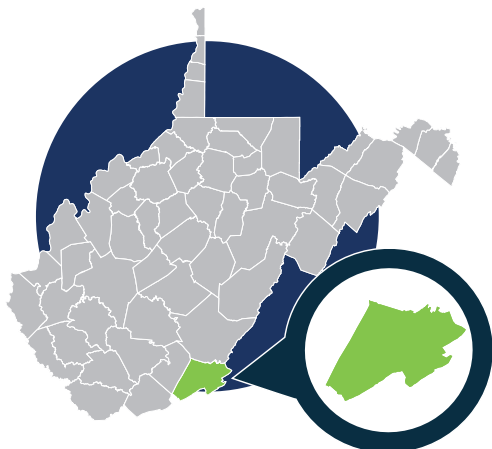

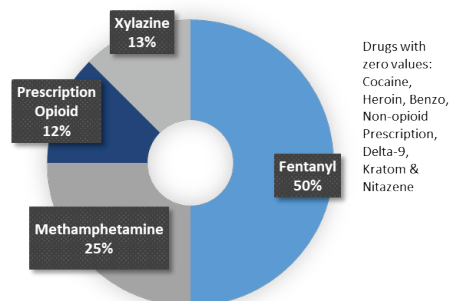

## Acronyms/Definitions

**Hospital SUD Response Program** - comprehensive approaches to SUD for individuals who present to the hospital system that can include screening, referral to treatment, MOUD induction, providing naloxone, and a Peer Recovery Support Specialist consult.

**Harm Reduction Program (HRP)** - refers to the use of practical strategies and ideas aimed at reducing the negative consequences associated with drug use.

**Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD)** - a pre-booking diversion program aimed at diverting low level criminal offenders away from incarceration and into treatment so that they can receive definitive care for their underlying addiction.

**Medication-Assisted Treatment/Medications for Opioid Use Disorders (MAT/MOUD)** - refers to the three U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved medications used to treat opioid use disorder: Methadone, Buprenorphine, and Naltrexone.

**Quick Response Team (QRT)** - teams who contact people within 24 to 72 hours of an overdose to connect them to treatment and other services.

**Regional Partnership Grant (RPG)** - integration of programs and services designed to increase the well-being, improve the permanency, and enhance the safety of children who are in, or at-risk of, out-of-home placements as the result of a parent or caregiver's SUD.

**Substance Use Disorder (SUD)** - the recurrent use of alcohol or drugs causing clinically significant impairment, including health problems, disability, and failure to meet major responsibilities at work, school, or home.
